On June 19, 1883 the Soboba Indian Reservation was established by an Executive Order that set aside 3,172.03 acres of land for the Soboba Band of Luiseño Indians for their permanent occupation and use. Located at the foothills of the San Jacinto Mountains in Riverside County, the reservation has deep canyons and rolling hills. It is 1,600 feet above sea level beginning at the San Jacinto River, which borders the Reservation's western boundary and climbs to about 2,600 feet in the northeastern and southern portions.

Soboba would later come under Mission influence by Mexico's occupation of California near the end of the 18th century. Mission San Juan Capistrano was established in 1776. Franciscans recorded a Rancheria located in the San Jacinto Valley. Soon after the formation of Mission San Luis Rey in 1798, Rancho San Jacinto was described by Fr. Jose Sanchez in September of 1798 as follows: "Proceeding in the same direction, we stopped at Jaguara, so-called by the natives, but by our people San Jacinto. This is the rancho for the cattle of San Luis Rey, distant from Temecula about eleven or twelve leagues."

The Luiseño language is an Uto-Aztecan language of California spoken by the Luiseño, a Native American people. During the 16th century, at the time of first contacts with the Spanish, Luiseño inhabited the coastal area of Southern California, ranging 50 miles from the southern part of Los Angeles County to the northern part of San Diego County and inland 30 miles. The people are called "Luiseño" due to their proximity to the Mission San Luis Rey de Francia.

For the past 127 years, the Tribe and its members have worked hard to build a strong Soboba Community. From its earliest years, the Luiseño people worked the land to develop a self-sufficient agricultural economy. Many worked in the outside communities in the apricot and citrus industries.

Today, the tribe remains a strong economic force in the San Jacinto Valley establishing working relationships with other tribes, while being committed to creating sustainable partnerships and relationships with their non-native neighbors just as in the earliest of times.

Indigenous people often sing their stories; Native Americans everywhere sang songs about various elements of creation, the plants animals and people. The Luiseño Indians of Southern CA sing birdsongs which are ancient stories that tell of special places and the relationship of humans, animals, and creation. Gourd rattles are typically used during traditional Native American bird songs and bird dances, including religious and spiritual ceremonies.

Since the beginning of our origin Bird singers have shared their songs with the people and they continue to sing as women dance the bird dances. As part of the tradition while bird singers stand and sing their birdsongs women dancers often join them, by dancing the women in this way the women put the songs into motion and make them live again.

The Soboba Band of Luiseño Indians and its culture department share and continue to teach young men and women to carry on the tradition of bird singing and dancing. They keep the songs alive among the Luiseño people at social gatherings held on and off the reservation.

Things to do in Riverside

While visiting Riverside enjoy the beautiful historical buildings just a walk away from The Mission Inn Hotel & Spa. The **Metropolitan Museum** was built in 1912 and served as a post office. Its features include Italian Renaissance style motifs. The city purchased the building in 1945 to house the police department and a museum; the museum took over the entire building in 1966 and remains today. The **Fox Theater** opened its doors for the first time in 1929 as a cinema and vaudeville house where well-known performers like Bing Crosby and Judy Garland once graced the stage. This Spanish colonial revival style theater was also the location for the first screening of *Gone with the Wind*. The **Arlington Heights Citrus Exchange** was completed in 1923 and served as the headquarters for Sunkist Growers Inc. and is also Spanish colonial revival style. Union **Pacific Railroad Depot** represents mission revival style and was completed in 1904. These are just some of the original buildings in Riverside dating back to the early 1900's that you might want to explore. If you enjoy the arts, maybe a trip to the **Jim Christiansen Art Exhibit** will intrigue you. You may also want you to satisfy your curiosity for renaissance times by visiting the **Dragon Marsh**—another historical building—this shop provides unique items for the renaissance faire and for spirituality. **Harada House** was purchased in 1915 by a local restaurateur, and was the first test and successful challenge of the California Alien Land Law in 1913 which prohibited land to be owned by aliens. While here you can't forget the **Tyler Mall** which should provide you with any shopping urges you have. There is also a **Farmers Market** at the **Moreno Valley Mall**. If you don't feel like going too far, you can take a tour at The Historic Mission Inn Hotel & Spa and spend hours taking beautiful pictures of the site. So come and enjoy a new experience with all the history this city brings. Take some time and enjoy the history of Riverside.

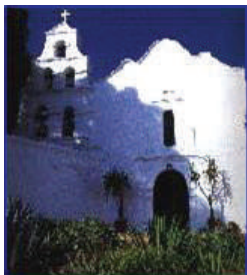

UC Davis offers CA NEW: PATHS members free training

The Center for Human Services at UC Davis Extension and the Inter County Training Consortium (ICTC) will be extending over 500+ workshops to current CA NEW: PATHS members. The ICTC is a consortium of 41 counties that share their UCD training resources. The ICTC counties include all northern counties, most central valley counties with the most southern county being Kern County. Staff in any of the ICTC counties can attend workshops offered through the Center for Human Services at UC Davis Extension in any of the 41 consortium counties on a space available basis at no cost. Now current CA NEW: PATHS members can also attend these workshops. Workshops include mostly line staff trainings such as Cooperation Requirements for CalWORKs, Identifying and Calculating Food Stamp Overissuances and Detecting and Preventing Applicant Fraud, but also include mandated trainings like Civil Rights Division 21 and classes in other programs such as Kinship Care and Comprehensive Geriatric Assessment.
